Cover photo: In November 2009 the Society purchased at auction circa 1845 portraits of Willard and Charlotte Clough of Hopkinton painted by well-known 19th-century itinerant artist Horace Bundy. The portraits had belonged to Nan McNicholas of Hopkinton, who had acquired them years ago from the Clough family home on Route 103. The portraits had never been cleaned or treated, but other than a small hole in Willard's portrait, were in excellent condition. The Society has had the portraits professionally cleaned and conserved, and they will be unveiled at our Annual Meeting on Sunday, April 18, 2010. The paintings will also be part of our summer exhibit featuring the Society's wonderful collection of Hopkinton family portraits, and the stories they tell.

2009 Dedication

With both great pride and gratitude we dedicate the 2009 Annual Report to Gene and Anne Slusser, long-time friends and benefactors to the Hopkinton Historical Society.

Gene grew up in a family passionate about radio and aviation and in 1942, at the age of 20, he left his native Colorado and traveled east to accept a position at MIT's Radiation Laboratory working on the development of radar. The successful development of this technology, as history indicates, would help to "change the course of the war." Also while at MIT Gene met and married Anne Longley, who would become his life-long partner.

In 1953 Gene and Anne moved to the Concord area where he helped to found Northeast Electronics Corporation. They moved into a home just outside of Hopkinton Village and while Gene concentrated on building the business, Anne was busy raising their young family and contributing her limited spare time to the welfare of their church, our schools and our community.

In 1958 Gene left Northeast Electronics in order to found Aerotronic Associates, a company initially dedicated to the development of test equipment for the photographic industry. Over time the company grew in both size and scope, employing over 250 people in Contoocook in the early 1980s and gaining a reputation for being a leading designer and premier provider of semiconductor and semiconductor-module test systems. Under Gene's guidance the company became a great success.

In the meantime the family moved into the large, beautiful colonial in Hopkinton Village directly across the street from the "Antiquarian Society" and Anne maintained her busy schedule as mother, wife, partner and citizen. One of Anne's most significant contributions to our town was the founding of Dial-a-Ride, which provides much-needed transportation to our senior citizens to this day.

Upon retirement Gene and Anne began to devote both time and treasure to the institutions that comprise the fabric of Hopkinton and the greater Concord area generally. Their church, the Concord Hospital, the Concord VNA Center, the Hopkinton Teen Center and, of course, the Slusser Senior Center have all been

beneficiaries of their remarkable generosity. The Hopkinton Historical Society has also long been an interest of theirs. They have generously donated in the past, and their recent donation of \$100,000 to the Society's Preservation Fund will help protect our most valuable asset, the beautiful and historically important Long Memorial Building.

Thank you, Gene and Anne.

President's Report

For the Hopkinton Historical Society, this was no ordinary year, to say the least. Your Board of Trustees made some significant decisions that enhance the collections, increased the visibility of the Society, and embarked upon a campaign to stabilize the financial impact of the Long Building's on-going maintenance. The Board welcomed a new Trustee, Scott Metzger, and sadly accepted the resignation of our Treasurer, Karen Mayo. Her contributions of putting into place sound financial controls will stand us in good stead for many years to come.

Our collections, which tell the story of Hopkinton's people, grew with the addition of the wagon now on permanent display in our main gallery. Its restoration, thanks to Carl Goodman, Lee Wilder, and Tom O'Donnell, creates a wonderful example of how goods and people were transported between Hopkinton and Concord in the last quarter of the 19th century. Two important mid-19th century portraits by Horace Bundy of Willard and Charlotte Clough, whose house still stands on Rte. 103, were acquired at auction and underwent conservation using monies from our Collections Committee. Added to our already outstanding collection of Hopkinton family portraits, these painting give the Society an unusually fine representation of itinerant artists working in NH.

The Society's programs during the year were outstanding. The 2009 summer exhibit, "Hopkinton's Attic: 150 Years of Collecting History," highlighted the improbable diversity of Hopkinton's material culture. From Native American artifacts to musical instruments, memorabilia from an art colony to grisly murder weapons, and military uniforms to 2008 gubernatorial and presidential campaign material, visitors could not help being impressed with Hopkinton's unique history. Our first Cemetery Walk was exceptionally well received and drew large crowds on the two days it was held, even on the one day that saw Hopkinton's first day of snow. Another successful "Tomorrow's Masterpieces Annual Art Show & Sale" capped off the year. Finally, after months of planning, Past-President Kathy Thesing directed the creation and implementation of a new sign to replace the deteriorating one that has now become a part of our collection of old Hopkinton display signs. The new sign, made by Russ Aubertin of Advantage Signs, includes our new logo designed by Jenifer Dexter. The sign, installed in March, will serve our needs for years to come.

The Trustees launched the Long Memorial Building Preservation Fund this past year to raise a minimum of \$150,000 as a board-directed fund, the income from which will be used for on-going maintenance of the building that houses our collections. I am pleased to announce that every board member has made a pledge to the campaign, which, with a lead gift from Eugene and Anne Slusser, and two other named gifts, now stands in excess of \$140,000. I am confident that our goal will be met and substantially exceeded when the campaign is completed at the end of this calendar year. Our stewardship of the collections depends upon housing them in a manner that preserves them to the highest possible standards. You, our members, should expect nothing less.

Finally, I want to publicly thank our Executive Director Heather Mitchell and Assistant Nancy Jo Chabot for their outstanding work on our behalf this year. Not only do they manage the institution, they also direct the activities of our volunteers (without whom the Society could not function), plan the exhibits and publication, greet the public, help our visitors with tours, research, and an updated web site, they even paint the walls. We are so fortunate to have such a great team at 300 Main Street.

Executive Director's Report

The Hopkinton Historical Society celebrated its 150th anniversary in 2009, and what a busy and eventful year it was! The Society featured three exhibits, including "Sounds from the Past: Music and Instruments from the Antiquarian Collection;" "Hopkinton's Attic: 150 Years of Collecting History;" and "Telling the Story: People and Objects from the Old Hopkinton Cemetery Walk."

In conjunction with the exhibits the Society offered several programs, including a lecture and performance by Andy Wilson on the Society's newly-restored Abraham Prescott double bass during our annual meeting in April; a lecture by local author Howard Mansfield on the meaning of the things we save in June; and a presentation by the New England Document Conservation Center on the Society's recently-conserved 1811 James Wilson globe in August.

In addition to our Annual Appeal, the Society held two fundraisers in 2009: a Cemetery Walk through the Old Hopkinton Cemetery in September, and our 19th Annual Art Show and Sale "Tomorrow's Masterpieces" held from September to December. Directed by Christine Hamm, the Cemetery Walk attracted more than 200 people and helped raise more than \$1,000 for the Society. The Art Show featured works by more than 50 local artists, and raised more than \$2,200 for the Society.

Other 2009 activities included restoration of the Abraham Prescott double bass, conservation of a rare 1811 James Wilson globe, installation of the "Hopkinton & Concord" wagon in our second floor gallery, and reprinting A Walk Through Two Villages, a pictorial history of Hopkinton. Additional events included a Volunteer Tea in February; a talk by Art Show Curator Parker Potter in November; a needle felting workshop by textile artist Marcy Schepker in November; a guitar performance by Henry Merrow and Geordie MacDonald for the Art Show's "Last Chance Night" in December; and a Holiday Family Program with local mosaic artist Lizz Van Saun in December.

Our volunteers play an important role in fulfilling the Society's mission to collect, preserve, and exhibit items relevant to the Town of Hopkinton. Last year more than 50 people volunteered their time at the Society, helping with everything from yard work, to photography, to data entry. If you are interested in volunteering, please give us a call.

In addition to our exhibits and programs, the Historical Society offers genealogical and historical research to the public. We have copies of abstracted deeds and vital records, information on many family histories, town reports, and state papers available for research purposes. The Society is contacted frequently for information from people around the country.

Finally, located across the street from the Cracker Barrel Store is Chase Park, which is owned by the Historical Society. It is a lovely garden cared for by volunteers Inge Eddy, Jackie Rietveld, Debbie Monroe, Peg Kimball, Ben Wilson and Green Horizon

Landscaping. With its seasonal plantings and granite bench, it is a great spot to sit and enjoy a lunch or to just simply watch life go by.

Cataloging Project

Thanks to the diligent collecting of its founding members, the generous donations by members and area residents, and the selective purchases of the Collections Committee, the Society owns more than 5,000 artifacts, nearly 700 books, as well as a sizable collection of letters, diaries, photographs, and ephemera. As part of our on-going cataloging project, Lynn Clark, along with volunteers Beth Bissonnette and Beth Bloomquist, continue to document objects to enter the information into our electronic database.

In addition to our on-going cataloging of objects, we also began cataloging textiles, glass plate negatives, and over-sized ephemera in 2009. Having information about these collections in our database will help us more easily cross-reference items and give us a richer understanding of our collections.

This database base has proved it usefulness in searching for object information for general inquires, exhibit planning, and collections management. Since 2005 when the project began, nearly 3,000 of the Antiquarian Society's 5,000+ artifacts have been cataloged, as well as nearly 100 textile items, 670 images, and 280 ephemera items.
