With a great deal of pride we dedicate the 2011 Hopkinton Historical Society Annual Report to volunteer Shana Hawrylchak, who spent countless hours during the fall of 2011 cataloging the Society's textile collection, drafting policy revisions, and offering guidance on several storage issues.

For the past few months, the Hopkinton Historical Society has been privileged to have museum professional Shana Hawrylchak volunteer her time and expertise in several much-needed areas at the Society. Her first project, cataloging the Society's textile collection, was a massive undertaking. Shana tackled it with the help of her sister, Hopkinton Historical Society Treasurer Anya Kattef. Over the course of two months the two of them went through every nook and cranny of the Long Memorial Building, eventually photographing, inventorying, and entering computer records for 1,113 distinct items, including quilts, historic clothing, and clothing accessories. As a result, all of the records and images of these items are now available for easy searching in the Society's computerized collection database.



Other projects Shana has taken on include preparing a grant proposal for the textile collection; drafting a plan to create more appropriate storage for the textile collection; researching options for a Plexiglas cover for the Society's dugout canoe; and suggesting revisions to Society policies regarding the care and treatment of objects in the Society's collection.

Shana's advice and assistance in so many areas has been an invaluable gift to the Society. She is knowledgeable, meticulous, and creative. Thank you, thank you, thank you!

# **President's Report**

2011 proved to be an exciting and challenging year. The continuing economic recession, the departure from Hopkinton of key volunteers and the surfacing of new opportunities demanded our staff of Heather Mitchell and Nancy Jo Chabot, as well as our excellent Board of Trustees, to respond quickly and effectively to changing conditions.

First, I would like to recognize two Board of Trustees members who stepped down in 2011, Bob Eddy and Bruce Salsbury. Bob ably served for many years as the Society's Secretary, and he will be greatly missed. Bruce served in many capacities over the years, including photographer and computer consultant, and we look forward to his return to the Board of Trustees. Having lost the services of such quality people we needed to search out equally talented replacements. We were very fortunate to have three really great people join our Board in 2011- Anya Kattef, Don Piatt and Roxanne Benzel. Anya took on the position of Society Treasurer, Roxanne assumed the role of our Board Secretary and Don brought his background in the investment world to help us move towards greater returns on our endowments. We were very fortunate to be able to recruit such talented people. I would also like to thank Society volunteer Jeff Dalzell, who moved away from Hopkinton in 2011, for his many contributions.

The continuing poor economy was the Society's primary challenge in 2011. Much of our asset base languished in accounts that were simply not performing well. The Board determined that the Society needed to acquire professional financial management which would, hopefully, allow us to maximize our return on our investments. We established a Search Committee, which developed a carefully designed plan requests for proposals that was sent to seven financial management firms who were invited to bid for our business. The Search Committee asked four firms to make in-person presentations. The Committee then reported its findings to the Board. The Board then selected McLean Asset Management located in Bedford, NH. Our investments were placed with McLean as of 1/1/12. Hopefully, we will begin enjoying significantly expanded financial returns on invested capital in 2012. One further note from a financial point of view, the Society is wrapping up its Long Memorial Building Preservation Fund Drive. Our original goal was \$150,000 but we are now approaching \$190,000. The Hopkinton Woman's

Club completed its pledge of \$10,000 this past January. The Hopkinton Historical Society cannot thank our many generous supporters enough!

2011 was also somewhat unique in terms of the Society's planned programs and exhibits. Our initial event for 2011 was our first Antiques Appraisal Day held in late May. The Hopkinton Historical Society joined forces with Skinner Auctioneers and Appraisers to offer a format similar to that of the popular PBS antiques show. More than one hundred people attended, all curious to find out what their treasures were worth. People brought in paintings, toys, furniture, textiles, books and more. It was a very successful and fun event and we are planning to hold a second Appraisal Day and small antique show this coming June.

A second summer event was the Gould Hill Barn Sale. This was a rather spontaneous event that developed when Erick and Sue Leadbeater asked the Society if it would be interested in working with them to sell off the many collectible items that were stored in the barn and attic of the iconic Gould Hill Farm. The Society took on the responsibility of organizing, advertising and manning the sale of the more than two hundred items. When the Society opened the doors at 8:00am on Saturday morning there were scores of people already waiting to get in to buy their piece of New Hampshire farm history. Thanks to the efforts of so many Society members as well as the Leadbeaters, the day was a remarkable success. Items "flew off the shelves"-apple ladders, apple crates, incomprehensible tools, advertising memorabilia, apple buckets, license plates, and just about everything that wasn't nailed down!!

Our summer exhibit was "Along the Basket Trail" which we held in conjunction with the Mt. Kearsarge Indian Museum and the Warner Historical Museum. The organizers drew baskets from their own collections as well as from their communities. The exhibit was an expansive multi-faceted program which included three simultaneous exhibits, a series of ten lectures and handson workshops as well as a "basket documentation" day. It was all extremely well done and the Society received a Public Programming Award from the Association of Historical Societies of New Hampshire (AHSNH) recognizing the effectiveness and quality of our summer program.

Our planned Cemetery Walk had to be postponed to this year because the primary organizer, Chris Hamm, had personal commitments that took precedence and Jeff Dalzell, a key volunteer, had moved away. But our continued presence at the summer-long Farmers Market was very successful and our "Tomorrow's Masterpieces 21st Annual Art Show & Sale" was its usual great success.

The continued success of the Hopkinton Historical Society is solely because of the enthusiastic and untiring effort put forth by its Director and Administrative Assistant, Heather and Nancy Jo, and the great support of its Board of Trustees and its many, many volunteers. One particular effort deserves special recognition. Our Historic Textile and Costume Collection was in desperate need of defining, dating, documenting and organizing. The collection contains a wide variety of pieces ranging from quilts to military uniforms dating back as far as the early 1800s. Anya Kattef and her sister, Shana, who was visiting Anya, took on this task. The combination of their determination, energy and Shana's special knowledge allowed them to complete the task in approximately three weeks! Through the course of this project over 1,000 distinct pieces were identified and entered into our computerized database!

The Hopkinton Historical Society is a truly first-rate organization favored by an excellent staff and outstanding volunteers dedicated to the preservation and dissemination of the history of our lovely town.

# **Executive Director's Report**

2011 was a busy and eventful year! The Society featured two exhibits, including "Tomorrow's Treasures: Recent Acquisitions of the Hopkinton Historical Society," and "Along the Basket Trail," a collaborative summer exhibit. The exhibit originally grew out of a shared interest in local Native and African American baskets and basketmakers. As staff and volunteers from Hopkinton Historical Society, Mt. Kearsarge Indian Museum, Warner Historical Society, and Wijokadoak, Inc. met and studied these baskets, we realized important stories were woven into them. These stories became the themes around which the exhibit and programs were organized. "Along the Basket Trail" received a Public Programming Award from the Association of Historical Societies of New Hampshire (AHSNH), which recognized "an effective, high-quality collaborative effort that explored themes that have been under-represented in New Hampshire programs."

In conjunction with the exhibits, the Society offered several programs. The first program was Stephen H. Long: An Engineer and Explorer of Rare Talent, presented by Dick Hesse at our annual meeting in April. A series of programs and workshops was also held as part of the summer exhibit, and included:

- Basket Discovery and Documentation Day
- Brown Ash Basket Traditions: Ash Pounding and Basketmaking Demonstration
- Shakers and Native Americans: "A Curious Affinity"
- The Sadoques Family of Keene, NH: Abenaki Artisans and Entrepreneurs
- The Language of Baskets, Make a Bookmark using Traditional Abenaki Techniques
- Looking at Race: Native American and African American Basketmaking
- Reflections on Newt Washburn, Basketmaker and Teacher.

In addition to the Annual Appeal and the Preservation Fund, the Society held three fundraisers in 2011: an Antiques Appraisal Day in May, the Gould Hill Barn Sale in June, and the 21<sup>st</sup> Tomorrow's Masterpieces Annual Art Show and Sale held from September to December. All three events were successful and well-attended.

2011 activities also included a Volunteer Tea in March and a very successful table at the Contoocook Depot's Farmer's Market where Carol Duston, Audrey Gardner, and Mary Leadbeater sold many t-shirts and books. Additional events included an Art Show Curator's Talk with Parker Potter, and a Holiday Family Workshop with New Hampshire printmaker Christopher Morse in December.

Building improvements included installation of a drainage system in the basement and a leaf guard for the gutter.

Upcoming events for 2012 include our summer exhibit on farming in Hopkinton, a town-wide membership drive, our second Antiques Appraisal Day in June, and our third Cemetery Walk this fall.

In addition to our exhibits and programs, the Historical Society offers genealogical and historical research to the public. We have copies of abstracted deeds and vital records, information on many family histories, town reports, and state papers available for research purposes. The Society is contacted frequently for information from people around the country.

Our volunteers play an important role in fulfilling the Society's mission to collect, preserve, and exhibit items relevant to the Town of Hopkinton. Last year approximately 75 people volunteered their time at the Society, helping with everything from yard work, to cataloging, to data entry. If you are interested in volunteering, please give us a call.

Located across the street from the Cracker Barrel Store is Chase Park, which is owned by the Society. It is a lovely garden cared for by volunteers Inge Eddy, Jackie Rietveld, Debbie Monroe, Peg Kimball, Ben Wilson and Green Horizon Landscaping. With its seasonal plantings and granite bench, it is a great spot to sit and enjoy a lunch or to just simply watch life go by.

My report would not be complete without expressing my thanks to museum staff Nancy Jo Chabot and Lynn Clark, our volunteers, and the Board of Trustees. Their insights, ideas, and support make my job challenging, interesting, and fun!

## **Collections Committee**

Over the course of 2011, more than thirty different donors gave a total of more than one hundred items of local historical importance to the Hopkinton Historical Society. They include items from the early 1800s to the modern day, and range in topics from the Kingsbury & Davis Machine Company and the Hopkinton Fair to farming in Hopkinton. # **Cataloging Project**

Thanks to the diligent collecting of its founding members, the generous donations by members and area residents, and the selective purchases of the Collections Committee, the Society owns more than 5,000 artifacts, nearly 700 books, as well as a sizable collection of letters, diaries, photographs, and ephemera. As part of our on-going cataloging project, Lynn Clark, along with volunteers Beth Bissonnette and Beth Bloomquist, continue to document objects to enter the information into our electronic database.

In addition to our on-going cataloging of objects, we continued to catalog glass plate negatives and over-sized ephemera in 2011. The work done by Shana Hawrylchak and Anya Kattef in 2011 on cataloging the Society's textile collection is invaluable. Having information about these collections in our database will help us more easily cross-reference items and give us a richer understanding of our collections.

This database has proved its usefulness in searching for object information for general inquires, exhibit planning, and collections management. Since 2005 when the project began, nearly 3,100 of the Antiquarian Society's 5,000+ artifacts have been cataloged, as well as more than 460 books, 1,000 images, and 850 ephemera items.
