

2012 Dedication



It is with honor that we proudly dedicate the 2012 Hopkinton Historical Society Annual report to Fred Pilch. Fred's services to the HHS have been invaluable and we appreciate his financial acumen in promoting the well-being of this long-standing organization.

Fred's involvement with the Hopkinton Historical Society began in the late 1980s when he was invited to join by past Trustee Merry Hall. From the onset, he served as the treasurer/banker in his role as Trustee. He performed the all-important task of payroll during his entire tenure until this year.

Fred grew up in New Jersey and discovered Concord, New Hampshire on March 17, 1956. He says that he clearly remembers the day because there was a big, big snowstorm, which occurred on the same day that he was traveling to New Hampshire to interview for a job with the Mechanics National Bank of Concord! Fred did get the job with Mechanics Bank which became a part of the Bank of New Hampshire, now known as TD Bank North, for his entire career. He remembers that his wife's arrival to New Hampshire coincided with the day of the Concord Hospital dedication to their new location on Pleasant Street. As it turns out, this was a preview of many years of Board service with the Concord Hospital. Fred and his growing family moved to Hopkinton in 1965 where they purchased a home on Gould Hill Road.

Coinciding with Fred's career at the Bank of New Hampshire, volunteering and community service has been a mainstay for him. In the past 41 years, he has served in several capacities at Concord Hospital, including as a trustee, secretary, and with the investment and

finance committees. Fred continues to offer his talents in helping to prepare tax returns on behalf of AARP members.

Fred made significant contributions for over 30 years in his volunteer work as vice president of the Rolfe & Rumford Home for orphaned children. He has also served as treasurer of the White Mountain School, formerly known as St. Mary's in the Mountains, in Bethlehem, New Hampshire, and as president of Family Service of Concord, which merged into Child & Family Service of New Hampshire. Fred was a major influence in establishing the Chase Forest on Jewett Road serving as President of the Samuel Myron Chase Forests which was set up under the will of Samuel Myron Chase. Mr. Chase's will from the 1930s stipulated that "there was to be enough land and greenery to surround Hopkinton."

Traveling is Fred's continuing passion. His love of travel was sparked during his service in the U.S. Army where he was in the occupation force in Germany during 1945-6, just after World War II. It was a venture into Switzerland that ignited his interest and he's been going strong ever since! His next trip is planned for Albania because, as Fred says, he hasn't been there yet.

Fred's contribution and influence with the Hopkinton Historical Society has been extremely valuable toward the success of the organization. When asked what he would share with the HHS membership, Fred shared this thought, "Volunteering is very rewarding. We should honor our past because it helps us to look toward the future. Our challenge for the future is to keep people interested in serving our community."

The Hopkinton Historical Society wishes good travels to Fred and much appreciation!

President's Report

2012 was a year in which the Society was able to concentrate on our financial structure and, for that matter our physical structure, despite the continuing economic recession. But before I discuss the events of 2012 let me speak to the resignation of a valued member of the Board of Trustees. Since we gathered last year Fred Pilch, a long-time member of the Board and for many years the Society's treasurer, has resigned. Fred was invaluable in providing great financial council to the Board and leading us through the "weeds" of the various non-profit tax codes that define our activities. Fred will be missed not only because of the sound financial advice he provided but, more importantly, because he was a loyal trustee as well as a good friend.

Probably the most important effort put forth by the Board and the Society staff in 2012 was the hiring of a professional financial advisory firm, McLean Asset Management of Bedford, New Hampshire, whose function is to protect and, hopefully, grow our financial base. The Hopkinton Historical Society had been negatively affected by the recession and much of our asset base was simply languishing in accounts that were not performing well. The Board voted to move investment control effective January, 2012. Thankfully, our timing so far has been excellent but we all recognize that despite the best efforts losses can be suffered as well as gains enjoyed. 2012 was a very good year for the Society's investments.

The other financial effort that we effectively concluded in 2012 was the completion of the Long Memorial Building Preservation Fund Drive. The Drive brought in \$197,650. The interest and appreciation earned from this money may be used to maintain and improve the Society's most valuable asset, the Long Building. With the availability of funds earned late in the year we were able to address some of the maintenance needs of the building. We installed drainage in the basement and had a new sump system installed to handle the flow of water around the front of the building. We also had the gutters reconfigured in the front of the building. We expect these two projects will solve our erosion problems in the front of the building along the foundation and the walkway. Our initial experience was good enough to give us the confidence to install our lovely new brick walkway leading to our front door.

One other truly noteworthy activity that took place at the Society in 2012 was an analysis and evaluation of our overall operation, a “Conservation Assessment Program,” conducted by a collections expert and an architectural expert and paid for by a grant from Heritage Preservation and the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The assessors spent three days at the Society and looked at all aspects of museum management and procedures and evaluated how effectively we were functioning. The result was an excellent report highlighting our positive aspects and pointing out where we might improve and how we might go about implementing policies that will help build a better historical society for the Town of Hopkinton.

Our Collections Committee, under the guidance of Carol Duston, continued its effort of evaluating and accepting (or rejecting) the many items that are brought to the Museum monthly. Each item formally accepted must be acknowledged and catalogued. This is work that cannot be put off or a substantial backlog develops very quickly. The Committee had the opportunity to acquire a beautiful highboy attributed to David Young, an early 19th century Hopkinton furniture maker. Because the first floor exposition space was so skillfully reorganized by Heather and Nancy Jo, these pieces as well as two stately grandfather clocks that were stored upstairs are now on display.

Our 2012 traditional summer program was an extensive look at the working farms in Hopkinton. It incorporated visits to each active farm with presentations by experts such as Steve Taylor, former New Hampshire Secretary of Agriculture, and Taryn Fisher, a Hopkinton resident working on her doctorate in sustainability at Franklin Pierce College. The presentations were remarkably interesting and entertaining. Another feature of the summer program was a town-wide display of antique farm equipment. The equipment is part of an extensive collection owned by Frank Davis, a Hopkinton native and member of the Hopkinton Historical Society. The displays truly brought “reality” to the difficulty of farming in the 19th century in New Hampshire.

Our Tomorrow’s Masterpieces Annual Art Show & Sale was probably our largest and best attended show yet! Over forty artisans displayed their work and a very high percentage was sold to those attending. It was a very successful show.

Our other major event was the October Cemetery Walk. This biannual event, produced by Christine Hamm and written by Jeff Dalzell, featured the New Hopkinton Cemetery in Hopkinton Village. It, too, was very well attended and because there was so much “good material” buried in “New Hop” a terrific time was had by all. Our next Cemetery Walk will be held at the Stumpfield Cemetery in 2014.

Looking ahead to 2015, it will be Hopkinton’s 250th Anniversary!!! Our town and our Historical Society has much work to do between now and then to truly celebrate our great New Hampshire and great New England town of which we can be very proud.

In closing let me say that being the Society’s President these past two years has been truly fun and an excellent experience for me. Heather and Nancy Jo do marvelous work!! They are hardworking and incredibly creative! And, of course, the fine people that dedicate themselves to being Trustees of our lovely Historical Society are simply the best!

Director's Report

2012 was a very full year for the Society in terms of exhibits and programs. The year began with our annual meeting which included a social, salute to volunteers, and a program by Sarah Smith, author of *They Sawed Up a Storm*. Smith told the story of an extraordinary group of women -- including Violet Story of Hopkinton -- who operated a sawmill during World War II. Ted and Dave Story, sons of Violet Story, attended the event and were able to add their memories of their mother working at the sawmill.

Our summer exhibit was "Farming in Hopkinton: A Story of Change & Adaptation." The exhibit focused on six long-standing farms in town that are still in operation, including Beech Hill Farm, Bohanan Farm, Gould Hill Farm, Houston's Pine Lane Farm, Owen Farm, Stonynook Farm. Programs included a talk on dairy farming Hopkinton resident Taryn Fisher, an Open Farm Day at local farms, a children's program on corn with educator Ruth Smith, and a Humanities Council program on the history of dairy farming in New Hampshire with Steve Taylor.

Throughout the summer and into the fall Mary Leadbeater and Carol Duston manned a table at the Farmers' Market held at the Contoocook Depot. In June, they hosted a book signing for the newly-released book, "Hopkinton and Contoocook," with author Mala Duclos Tyler. In addition to selling items from the museum shop, Mary and Carol also have information about upcoming exhibits and programs.

Our Tomorrow's Masterpieces Annual Art Show & Sale opened with a gala Champagne Reception on September 29. Artists were given the option of submitting pieces with a farming theme as a tie-in to our summer exhibit, and many of them did. We had an abundance of chickens, cows, and other farm animals, as well as other assorted farm scenes. Guest Curator Parker Potter did a wonderful job arranging the art, and sales were strong.

On October 12th and 13th the Society held its third Cemetery Walk at the New Hopkinton Cemetery. Written by Jeff Dalzell, directed Christine Hamm, and filled with talented local actors telling the stories of our town, the Cemetery Walk was a great success both in terms of entertainment and as a fundraiser for the Society.

Sadly, the town of Hopkinton and the Hopkinton Historical Society lost a dear friend on October 19th. Audrey Gardner was a talented artist, antique shop owner, and dedicated volunteer. In the days following her death several members of the Society organized an exhibit of her artwork at the Contoocook Depot where Audrey had volunteered so much of her time. More than 20 people loaned more than 50 pieces of artwork for the exhibit which was open to the public for three days, including the afternoon of Audrey's memorial service. Among the many people who came to the exhibit was Bob LaPree, retired senior photographer at the NH Union Leader and long-time neighbor of Bruce and Audrey Gardner. It was Bob who suggested that Audrey's art be put into a book and graciously offered to do the photography. The book, *A Tribute to Audrey*, grew out of our town's love for Audrey and it is our hope that through it, the memory of Audrey and her wonderful artwork will live on.

In December the Society participated in the town-wide Starry, Starry Weekend event. We held a Last Chance Reception for the Annual Art Show & Sale, and a book signing with several local authors.

In addition to our exhibits and programs, the Historical Society offers genealogical and historical research to the public. We have copies of abstracted deeds and vital records, information on many family histories, town reports, and state papers available for research purposes. The Society is contacted frequently for information from people around the country.

Our volunteers play an important role in fulfilling the Society's mission to collect, preserve, and exhibit items relevant to the Town of Hopkinton. Last year approximately 65 people volunteered their time at the Society, helping with everything from yard work to cataloging to data entry. If you are interested in volunteering, please give us a call.

Located across the street from the Cracker Barrel Store is Chase Park, which is owned by the Society. It is a lovely garden cared for by a group of dedicated volunteers. Peg Kimball and Deb Monroe water and care for the plants during the summer, and John Cook keeps the lawn trimmed and lovely all season. Other volunteers include Ben Wilson, Jackie Rietveld, and Green Horizon Landscaping. Overseeing all of their efforts is Inge Eddy, who helps with everything from planting to mulching to raking.

My report would not be complete without expressing my thanks to museum staff Nancy Jo Chabot, Lynn Clark, and Elissa Barr, as well as to our volunteers and the Board of Trustees. Their support and contributions help keep the Society running and make my job interesting and a lot of fun.

Cataloging Project

Thanks to the diligent collecting of its founding members, the generous donations by members and area residents, and the selective purchases of the Collections Committee, the Society owns more than 5,000 artifacts, nearly 700 books, as well as a sizable collection of letters, diaries, photographs, and ephemera. As part of our on-going cataloging project, Lynn Clark and Elissa Barr continue to document objects to enter the information into our electronic database.

In addition to our on-going cataloging of objects, we continued to catalog glass plate negatives and over-sized ephemera in 2012. This database has proved its usefulness in searching for object information for general inquires, exhibit planning, and collections management. Since 2005 when the project began, more than 3,100 of the Antiquarian Society's 5,000+ artifacts have been cataloged, as well as more than 460 books, 1,225 images, and nearly 1,000 ephemera items.
